THE TEMPER OF THE NORTH.

From the Golden Era, of San Francisco, we
clip the following. The Era is strictly a literary
paper, though when politics has been dis-
cussed in its columns it has been so unqualified-
ly Union as to cause its readers to class it with
the New England style of literary journals.

Hence its conservatism in the following should
have the more weight. It says:
"Much has been said at various times in the
past year concerning the temper of the South.
An idea seems to prevail that an irritability
exists in that section which prevents a complete
restoration of the Union. A portion of the press
which has a peculiar way of showing its attach-
ment for the Union is industrious in the accumu-
lation of evidence of southern ill-humor and
defiance of the South. Doubtless such a feeling
exists to some extent; but it is a question if the
temper of the North is not the greater obstacle
to harmonious reunion so greatly to be desired.

The most marked feature of the Northern tem-
per is distrust. It gives the South no credit
in its own sincerity. In the face of the pro-
testations of to-day it persists in flinging the
deeds of yesterday. It says through its press
and its legislation, "You are rebels at heart,
and would be in deed if you dared. You are
rebels by nature and education, and will act
in accordance with your instincts as soon as you
shall think yourselves strong enough to act with
effect. You have no honor, no truth, no patri-
otism, no regard even for your own interests."
Acting upon this principle, the North proceeds
to re-mould the southern mind with the rigid
hand of legislation. Northern ideas are trans-
planted from the North to the South, and when
not waiting to see if they flourish or decay, the
South is called upon to accept them as its own.
If it protests, the protestation is regarded as an
evidence of a rebellious spirit. It is declared
unfit to take part in the councils of the nation
until it shall have converted to all the dog-
mas of the dominant party in the North. Now
it is quite possible that the ideas which are
suggested to the North are not suited to the South.
Truth itself is not so inflexible a nature as to
yield nothing to the conditions of society.
There is doubtless a religion which is nearer to
the divine idea than all other religions; there is
a form of government which is a nearer ap-
proach to perfection than all other forms of gov-
ernment; but it does not follow that the best re-
ligion is better suited to a certain people than
any other religion, or the best possible form of
government, better calculated than another
to promote the prosperity and happiness of all
nations, regardless of their peculiar character-
istics. Nature, education, and the habits of life
fit certain men for certain ideas; and it is by no
means essential, or even desirable, that the same
ideas shall prevail through all degrees of lati-
tude or longitude. Nature causes a different
nature to grow in one zone from that which in-
habits another. It is not necessary to argue which
civilization is the higher; it is enough to know
that in many respects they are radically differ-
ent.

Another feature of the temper of the North is
a disposition to assume that principles which
are good for itself are good for others. It makes
no distinction between the good and the bad
made in nature, and in people of the same race
living in different latitudes. The right of nature
to make distinction is not recognized. If nature
has done so it has erred and must be set right
at whatever cost. The correct standard has been
discarded, and a false one substituted, and hence
all men must be modeled upon that. If the shell
which the model has grown to fill does not fit
creatures of another growth, so much the worse
for the latter. It is not possible for the former
to be in any way imperfect.

This disposition of a people to arrogate to it-
self the right to fix the limits of truth does not
argue the highest type of being nor the most
advanced order of civilization. Since the death
of the first man for opinion's sake, bigotry has
been all but ignorance. Educated men are of
ten bigoted for education's sake, and heretics
made in a people or individual. Education has
a tendency to expand the mind, unless the
orbit of mind is fixed by nature too close to its
centre. True education only adds to its posses-

its possession, to its unwillingness and to its
bigotry. Instead of making it more liberal, it
makes it more narrow, and in a more exclusive
form.

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PRIZE FIGHT.—The Helena Republican, of the 25th ult., contains a full report of the pugilistic combat for which Messrs. Con. Orem and Hugh O'Neil have been disciplin-

ing their physical forces during the past three months. It took place at Helena, upon the 24th, in the presence of about fifteen hundred persons; fifty-one rounds were fought, and the contest occupied fifty-three minutes. O'Neil weighed one hundred and eighty-seven pounds, and relied upon his strength to win the victory. Orem's weight was one hundred and forty pounds; but his superior science and strategy neutralized the apparent advantage of his opponent. Orem was cool and maintained a defensive policy in the opening rounds. O'Neil was passionate and made desperate assaults upon his enemy, who repelled them in the outset by "going down." In the latter part of the fight, when O'Neil had been exhausted to a certain extent by his aggressive tactics, Orem, who had been eagerly watching for his moment, displayed his energy and wind which he had hitherto wisely retained in the reserve. O'Neil, in a temporary excitement, struck a "foul" blow, when his antagonist was upon his knees, and the prize was awarded to Orem. Both were severely punished, but could have maintained the struggle for some time. The audience appeared to be satisfied with the result, although a few parties, who had probably lost dust or greenbacks by the defeat of their favorite, expressed their opinion in language which was more forcible than elegant, and insinuated that it was like some "gold" horse races.
