SOUTHERN MATTERS.

Augusta, Sept. 5.—A large democratic mass meeting was held here today. Toombs, General Wright, and others made speeches.

Atlanta, Sept. 5.—The House has passed a resolution that the persons having the next highest number of votes to the expelled members shall be declared members of the House.

Chicago, Sept. 10.—In the House a message arrived from the Governor, enclosing a report of the case of persons application to seats vacated by expelled negroes.

Resolved, That that portion of the communication from the Governor, reflecting upon the action deciding on the eligibility of free persons of color, under the Constitution, be restored to the Governor with the following resolution:

Resolved, That the members of both Houses are judges of what are the qualifications of the members of each House, and not the Governor. They are keepers of their own consciences and not of that of His Excellency.

A resolution was passed to swear in the members having the next highest vote who are not ineligible under the 3d section of the Fourteenth Amendment.

New Orleans, Sept. 5.—A bill has passed the Legislature authorizing the city government of New Orleans to borrow a million dollars for current expenses of the city.

Pinchbeck, the mulatto Senator, made a speech in the Senate yesterday, charging the people of the city with manifesting a growing disposition to murder men for political opinions and for the color of their skin.

New Orleans, Sept. 8.—The House yesterday unseated the democratic member from the parish of New Orleans on the ground of ineligibility, and admitted his opponent, who was defeated by a majority of 300.

A Republican special gives a telegram from Pinchbeck, colored Senator from New Orleans, denying that he made any threats in his recent speech.

Louisville, Sept. 8.—A company of 15 or 20 mounted men entered the town of Versailles, Ky., on Sunday, firing on a number of negroes.

OFFICIAL.

LAW OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Second Session of the Fortieth Congress.

[Public-42.]

An Act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine.

[CONCLUDED.]

For expenses of Naval Academy, viz:

For pay of professors and others, seventy-six thousand seven hundred and six dollars.

For pay of watchmen and others, forty-five thousand two hundred and ninety-four dollars.

For contingent expenses, sixty-three thousand four hundred and fifty dollars.

For necessary repairs of quarters, ten thousand dollars.

For support of department of steam engineering, and for mechanics and laborers, five thousand dollars.

For expenses of Naval Observatory, viz:

For wages of one instrument-maker, one messenger, one porter, and three watchmen; for keeping grounds in order and repairs to buildings and enclosures; for fuel, light, and office furniture, and for stationery, chemicals for batteries, postage, and freight, ten thousand six hundred dollars.

For incidental expenses, five hundred dollars.

For salary of clerk, one thousand five hundred dollars.

For salary of three aids, four thousand dollars.

For preparing for publication the American Nautical Almanac, namely: For pay of composers, fifteen thousand dollars.

For pay of clerk, one thousand two hundred dollars.

For payment of expenses of visitors to the Naval Academy, two thousand dollars.

BUREAU OF ORDNANCE.

For guns, gun-carriages, shot, shell, magazine and laboratory stores, and equipments of all kinds; for gunpowder, small-arms, equipments, and ammunition; for fuel and materials necessary in carrying on the mechanical branches of the ordnance department at the navy yards and stations, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

For the necessary repairs of the magazine at Chelsea; for the dwellings at the magazine; for the necessary repairs to buildings on ordnance dock, and also repairs to tugs and lighters, and for repairs of ordnance dock at Ellis Island, New York; for repairs of magazine at Fort Mifflin; for repairing crane and wharf at Norfolk, and for repairs of magazine at Mare Island, fourteen thousand five hundred dollars.

For pay of the superintendents and the civil establishment at the several navy yards under this bureau, fifteen thousand dollars.

BUREAU OF CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIRS.

For pay of superintendents and the civil establishment at the several navy yards under this bureau, thirty-nine thousand dollars.

BUREAU OF STEAM ENGINEERING.

For pay of superintendents and the civil establishment at the several navy yards under this bureau, twenty-four thousand dollars.

For stores and materials, tools, repairs of machinery for steamers, boilers, instruments, and labor at navy yards, and repairs of the machinery and purchase of stores and materials for vessels of squadrons on foreign stations; and for transportation of materials, six hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

BUREAU OF PROVISIONS AND CLOTHING.

For pay of the civil establishment at the several navy yards under this bureau, and at the naval asylum, twenty-six thousand dollars.

For provisions and clothing, one million five hundred thousand dollars.

To meet the demands upon the bureau for freight and transportation of provisions, for stationery, for furniture and repairs of water fixtures; for paymasters and inspectors; for telegrams and postage; tolls and ferrisages; and for ice, one hundred thousand dollars.

BUREAU OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

For necessary repairs and improvements of hospitals and appendages, including roads, walls, wharves, outhouses, sidewalks, fences, gardens, farms, painting, glazing, blacksmiths, plumbers, and masons' work; for furniture, thirty thousand dollars.

For pay of the civil establishment under this bureau, at the several navy hospitals and navy yards, sixty thousand dollars.

MARINE CORPS.

For pay of officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians, privates, clerks, messengers, steward, nurse, and servants; for rations and clothing for officers' servants, additional rations to officers for five years' service; for uniforms, clothing, one hundred and seventy thousand dollars.

For provisions, one hundred thousand dollars.

For fuel, ten thousand dollars.

For military stores, viz: Pay of mechanics; repair of arms; purchase of accoutrements; ordnance stores, flags, drums, fifes, and other instruments, five thousand dollars.

For transportation of officers, their servants, troops, and for expenses of recruiting, twelve thousand dollars.

For repair of barracks, and for rent of offices where there are no public buildings, ten thousand dollars.

For contingencies, viz: Freight; ferrisage; toll; cartage; wharfage; purchase and repair of boats; compensation of judge advocates; permit for attending courts-martial, and courts of inquiry, and for constant labor; house-rent in lieu of quarters, and commutation for quarters to officers on ship-board; burial of deceased marines; printing, stationery, postage, telegraph, apprehension of deserters; oil, candles, gas; repairs of gas and water fixtures; water rent, forage, straw, barrack furniture; furniture for officers' quarters; bed seats, wrapping paper, oil cloth, crash, rope, twine, spades, shovels, axes, picks, carpenter's tools; keep of horse for the messenger; repairs to fire-engines; purchase and repair of benches, mess-tables, bunks; repairs to public conveyance; purchase and repair of harness; purchase and repair of handcars and wheelbarrows; scavenging; purchase and repair of gallies, cooking stoves, ranges; stoves where there are no grates; gravel for parade grounds; repair of pumps; furniture for sick and commanding officers' offices; brushes, buckets, brooms, paving, and for other purposes, seventy-five thousand dollars.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the number of persons authorized to be enlisted into the navy of the United States, including seamen, ordinary seamen, landsmen, and mechanics, and including apprentices and boys, is hereby fixed and established at eight thousand five hundred, and no more.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That all unexpended appropriations existing on the first day of July next, for any of the several heads of appropriation provided for in this act, shall be carried to the surplus fund, unless the same is necessary to pay expenditures made during the current fiscal year, or unless the same is necessary to execute contracts made before said date.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby directed in his next annual estimates to be prepared to state all the balances of appropriations made prior to the present session of Congress, and remaining unexpended on the first day of July next, and designate the amount of any necessary to execute contracts or pay expenditures properly chargeable to each of such balances.
