## Walla Walla Correspondence.

WALLA WALLA, September 17, '66.

ED. STATESMAN.—For forty days we have not had a blow that we could not fight with the same of "breaze." That is the matter. Day in, and day out; one continual calm, hot, smoky, sun-burning day. We have had a longer continued calm, and more smoky weather during the last month (past) than ever before known at this season. Since the 1st of September, or thereabouts, has averaged 85° in the shade, yet it has appeared comparatively cool to what weather we had during the month of August.

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## Jeff. Davis on President Johnson.

Dr. Craven, attending physician on Mr. Davis, at Fortress Monroe, has written a book, from which is extracted the following:

Mr. Davis was speaking of the Senate, I asked him his opinion of President Johnson, to which, for some moments, he made no reply, apparently hesitating whether to speak on the subject or not. At length he said, that President Johnson he knew no more than the papers told every one; but that of Mr. Johnson, when in the Senate, there especially just previous to the retirement of the Southern representatives from Congress. The position of Mr. Johnson with his associates of the South had never been pleasant, not from any fault or superciliousness on their part, but solely due to the intense, almost morbid, sensitive pride of Mr. Johnson. Sitting with associates, and of whom he knew pretensions to aristocracy, Mr. Johnson seemed to set up before his mind, and keep ever present with him his democratic or plebeian origin as a bar to warm social relations. This pride—for it was a pride of having no pride—his associates long respected, but it was not respected by him. They respected, and greatly original force of character, nothing could make him feel, or feel at home in their society. Some casual word dropped in debate, though uttered without a thought of his and again, would seem to wound him to the quick, and he would shrink back into the seclusion of his room, and again, would seem to gain strength from touching and humble life, as if in a word, while other members of the Senate were Democratic in theory, or as in their political faith, Mr. Johnson was a Democrat of pride, conviction and self-assertion—a man of class, and not only desired no higher grade of classification, but he would not be forced into its acceptance or retention when from his own pride he was made to do so. He was an immense worker and student, but always in the practicalities of life; little in the graces of literature. His habits were marked by temperance, industry, courage and unswerving perseverance; also, by intolerance of prejudices or preconceptions on certain points, and these no arguments could overcome. His faith in the judgment of the people was unlimited, and to their decision he was always ready to submit. One of the people by birth, he remained so by conviction, continually recurring to his origin, though he was by no means the least sensitive of the South in like circumstances. Mr. Davis mentioned Aaron V. Brown, of Mississippi, who had been in the Postmaster General under President Buchanan, and several others, who were of like Democratic education with Mr. Johnson, but who seemed to forget, and in regard to whom it was forgotten by their associates, that they had ever held less social rank than the former. Mr. Johnson's industry had raised them. Of Mr. Johnson's character, justice was an eminent feature, though not unaccompanied—as true justice rarely fails to be—with kindness and generosity. He was eminently faithful to his word, and possessed a courage and character only intense disgust in urged to do, or not to do, anything which might clash with his convictions of duty. He was indifferent to money, and careless of praise or censure when satisfied of the necessity of any line of action. But for his decided action against secession, he would probably have been given the chief director of the movement, and the President of the Confederacy. Mr. Stephens, indeed, held the same attitude up to the last moment, but on the secession of his State, had two alternatives of State or Federal treason, as it was called, presented, and chose the latter.

## THE SCANDAL ABOUT QUEEN VICTORIA.

The partiality of the Queen of England has shown for Simons as a suitor, has, by some silly fellow, been tortured into a partiality, not for the place, but for some old Scotchman there, with whom it is alleged she passes much time. Since the advent of Lord Dundreary, John Simons has been the subject of much gossip, and is considered worth laughing at unless he be extremely silly or stupid. So with regard to scandal according to this scandal monger, they must be of the most stupid and silly character to claim attention, and the one that has paid most attention to it is Pauch. Scarce a week passes but this paper has something to say about it. A London correspondent of the Boston Advertiser, too, had been led to investigate the matter, and with all seriousness says: "The sole pretext for this ruffianly attack is the fact that the Queen has a favorite servant, and prefers his services to those of her own household. It is no wonder that the Queen is open to any insinuation of this kind that the malicious choose to fling out, and can make no reply to periodicals like Pauch, which exist but to flatter the coxcombries of the Guards and of the silly fops about town—have the satisfaction of producing some sort of sensation by this sort of ribaldry; but in people of taste and character only intense disgust is inspired. I have traced the scandal as far as I can, seeking the authority from those who are the most active in parveying it, and I find that it rests upon incidents of the commonest occurrence. It is pure slander, though it gives deep pain to the objects of it, and adds to the distress of one who in her solitary greatness should possess the sympathies of generous men.

## HOW TO CURE BACHELOR IDIOSYNCRASIES.

## THE FIRST STRATEGIST IN EUROPE.—Gen. von Moltke has retired to his quarters, and is closely attended by his staff, and for the occupation of Vienna. This skilful strategist, who has been the chief director of the movements of his army, with seven Prussian armies, starting from different points, were collected at the necessary hour on the field of Konigsgratz, has never, except at that battle, appeared in front of his armies. Some distance in the rear, sitting calmly at his desk, he has traced on the map the course of his troops, and by means of his field telegraph, has flashed his orders to the several generals in immediate command with such skill and foresight that not a movement has failed, and every combination has been made at exactly the right moment. A quick, light blue eye, a high forehead, and a well set figure, mark him as an intellectual and energetic man, but though quick in action he is so prudent in discourse and so guarded in his speech that from his quality and his wide knowledge of European languages, he is known in the army as the man who speaks with seven tongues. Careful and laborious, he has worked out with his own hand and himself calculated almost every detail in the operations in which he has taken Europe by surprise from the lightning rapidity of his dispositions, before which the Austrian army has withered away. By such a division of Germany it will be seen that Prussia will be put in control of a population not greater than that of Great Britain and Ireland, and superior to that of the population of Italy even after the annexation of the Venetian population of Austria, after the cession of Venetia; however, still be nearly ten millions greater than that of Prussian Germany, and not more than two millions less than the population of France.
