At Home.—We are pleased to learn that Judge Wyche and family have arrived at Walla Walla and are again in their old quarters.

THE TRAVEL.—We notice that the stages between Walla Walla and Wallula, on the downward trips, are fairly loaded down with passengers.

SERENADE.—The editor acknowledges the compliment of a serenade, on Tuesday evening last, by the members of the Walla Walla Musical Association. Our young friends are assured that their compliment is appreciated.

BARTLETT PEARS.—Mr. A. B. Roberts, living at the upper end of town, has added to our stock of fruit by the contribution of a lot of Bartlett pears, of very large size and unusually fine flavor. The specimens we are constantly receiving all go to show that this Valley is destined to become a great fruit growing country.

THE CASTOR BEAN.—Mr. W. L. Wheelock has left at this office a specimen of the castor bean, grown on the farm of Mrs. Penny, in this Valley. It is possible that the castor bean may yet be cultivated in this Valley as an article of commerce. In Southern Illinois the experiment has been tried and attended with great success. In the cultivation of the castor bean, the ground is prepared as for other crops, and the seeds are planted much in the manner of those of Indian corn, with the exception that there is but one seed put into each hill, and that at every fourth row a space is left to admit of the passage of a team for the purpose of gathering the crop. The ripening commences in August; about twenty bushels to the acre is considered a fair yield. It is from the castor bean that the oil so familiar to childhood is obtained.

HARTMAN'S HOTEL.—The work on this new structure is well advanced, and already the building is an ornament to the town. The contractor, Mr. Wm. Glasford, who designed the building and superintended its erection throughout, deserves great credit for the manner in which he has fulfilled his task. Mr. Hartman has christened his new building the "Oriental Hotel," and when he gets into his new quarters will have accommodations for two hundred guests. In style and finish, the "Oriental" will be fully up to the best houses in Portland, and in every way will be conducted as a first class hotel. Mr. H. will signalize the opening of his house by a grand ball, which will come off on Wednesday evening, October 31, and without doubt will attract the elite and fashion of the country. Mr. Hartman has exhibited a commendable spirit of enterprise in erecting so commodious a structure, and certainly deserves to reap a rich harvest in return.

Main Street Improvement.—The work of grading and filling in Main street is completed, and it is due the contractors to say that they have faithfully complied with the terms of their contract. The street is now filled in and graded to its entire length, and as thus improved is a thoroughfare of which our people may well feel proud. Its good effect is already seen in the absence of the clouds of dust which formerly hung over Main street like a pall. In this respect alone the improvement is worth all its cost. With the commencement of the rainy season its advantages will be still more apparent. Now that the bed of the street has been placed in such excellent condition, we suggest that measures be taken looking to the improvement of the sidewalks. Inequalities in height and width should be remedied, and thus the sidewalks be made to correspond with the bed of the street. The locality and surroundings of our town are beautiful, and all that is requisite to render Walla Walla attractive to the eye of the stranger is the exhibition of a spirit of enterprise on the part of our citizens. At a time when neighboring towns are stagnant and fast going to decay, we are in the full tide of prosperity, and hence we can well afford to expend a portion of our means in beautifying our home.

Discovery of New Mines.—For several weeks back reports have been in the way of the discovery of rich and rich diggings on the headwaters of the Palouse, distant from Walla Walla about 150 miles. A party of prospectors—among them Don Weston, of Walla Walla—visited that locality early last spring, and although they obtained unmistakable indications of gold, owing to high water and other causes they were unable to work to advantage. A portion of the party returned to Walla Walla, whilst others remained and continued to prospect the country, and have at length succeeded in finding rich placer mines. The diggings, as described to us, are on a creek, tributary of the Palouse, and are reported to pay from \$20 to \$30 to the hand, working with few or no conveniences. The news of this discovery caused intense excitement at Lewiston. Indeed, there was a general stampede which carried off nearly the whole population. Merchants and idlers, working men and bummers, all struck a head-line for the new diggings, and left the town at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater to primal solitude. Our own people being less excitable, took the matter more coolly, but notwithstanding our staid character the news was rapidly caught up, and forthwith our idle and unemployed men began to move in the direction of the headwaters of the Palouse. The tide still continues to set that way, and should it continue promises to carry off our loose population. The new mines are reported to be about 20 miles to the right of the Coeur d'Alene road, and can be reached by wagons with the greatest ease. With regard to the character or extent of the mines, our information is meager, and confined exclusively to written letters from parties on the ground, who hurried to their friends to "keep up immediately!" One thing, however, is certain—new and rich mines have been discovered, their extent and character is yet to be ascertained.
