New Orleans, Oct. 24.—In reply to a communication from Gov. Wells in regard to a threatened negro insurrection in North Louisiana, Gen. Canby says he will order an additional force to Shreveport, and that arrangements have already been made to disburse the negroes of any wrong impressions imposed upon them.

News of Oct. 25.

New Orleans, Oct. 25.—The Honorable Washington special says it is positively known here that the trial of Jefferson Davis has been decided upon. The arrangements are nearly completed. The trial will be for treason, and will take place either in this city or Richmond.

Columbia, S. C., Oct. 26.—Gov. Perry's Message was read before the Legislature to-day.

He says that though his appointment was made several months after the other provisional Governors, South Carolina is now as far advanced as any other State. He alludes to the new Constitution as popular, democratic and inspiring the people with zeal and energy in developing the resources of the State.

Columbus, S. C., Oct. 27th.—In the Legislature to-day a message was received from Gov. Perry, transmitting a report of the commissioners appointed by the convention to prepare a system of laws adapted to the new State affairs.

New York, October 26.—The Tribune's Jackson (Miss.) correspondent says Governor Sharkey's first order to his militia is that they shall search the houses of freedmen for arms and ammunition.

Advices from Mississippi represent that the condition of the Republic is aggravated by every possible evasion of the laws for their benefit.

Halifax, Oct. 31.—The British Government proposes a project for the appointment of a Joint Commission to investigate the claims of citizens of the two countries, growing out of the late civil war.—Oregonian.

Prospect Ahead.

Walla Walla has, notwithstanding statements to the contrary, the same prospect ahead that she had three years ago. The same facilities are as good to-day, if not better, to enrich the valley, as they were in the palmy days of Oro Fino, Elk City and Florence mines.

But, this with time, has changed. Walla Walla is, as she always will be, the main supply depot for all the mining camps above Walla.

The gold fields of Blackfoot promise a market for a large portion of our productions, and it being easy of access at all times of the year, it will be the cause of this valley becoming richer by hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The new quartz mines discovered at Florence and Coeur d'Alene, promises to bring about a renewal of the same state of things that existed in '62, when the great rush was made to Salmon River.

All the land that has heretofore been vacant, is being rapidly settled by emigrants from the Eastern States, and men who were farmers before they came here. This is one of the things that has impeded the prosperity of the valley.

Notwithstanding all the indications of prosperity, some are predicting, as they always have done ever since Walla Walla became of the size to bear that title, that the town is "gone in," and that "in another season the town will hardly show any sign of life, owing to its dullness."

This is, at present one of the most lively towns on the coast. Persons coming from the Dalles and Portland state that there is a much larger business being done in Walla Walla than either of those places.

Our agricultural resources will, without the aid of anything else, make this a good town. But, when speaking of the agricultural department, alone, supporting the town, we make mention of something which will not be done for twenty years.

FOR BLACKFOOT.—Scarcely a stage arrives from the Landing that does not bring more or less persons bound for the Blackfoot country. They all defer purchasing their outfits until arriving at Walla Walla, and in this they not only display good judgment but contribute materially toward enlivening the local trade.

But as this has not been done in any of the cases in the townships referred to, they still have the liberty to "choose which" law they will claim under. Very respectfully, OWEN WARD, Register.
