

OFFICIAL PAPER.—F. W. Seward, Acting Secretary of State, notifies us that the STATESMAN has been selected as the "U. S. official paper for Washington Territory."

THE IDAHO LEGISLATURE.—The fourth session of the Idaho Legislature convened at Boise City, Dec. 4th. The Statesman has a full report of the proceedings. The Council was organized by the election of George Ainslie as President, and C. C. Dudley Secretary.

LIQUORS SEIZED.—Collector Geer made last Monday a seizure of liquors consisting of twenty seven barrels of Walla Walla whisky belonging to the firm of I. T. Reese & Co.

THESE LIQUORS were manufactured at Mr. I. T. Reese's Distillery, Walla Walla. Mr. R. has receipts in his possession to show that he has in all respects complied with the revenue law.

MILITARY.—Special Orders No. 105, from the headquarters of the Military Division of the Pacific, dated November 26th, direct Major General George Crook, Lieutenant Colonel Twenty-third United States Infantry, to proceed to Fort Boise, Idaho, and relieve Brevet Lieutenant Colonel Louis H. Marshall from the command of the District of Boise.

CROPS IN COLVILLE VALLEY.—Dr. Tobey, an old resident of Colville Valley, estimates the wheat crop for the last season at 150,000 bushels, oats, 100,000 bushels. They had also large crops of potatoes, onions and cabbages.

CONGRESSIONAL.—Private advices from Olympia state that W. W. Miller is the most prominent aspirant on the democratic side. The wires are being set for the re-nomination of Denny by the radicals, with Mr. Miller as his opponent.

FROM OLYMPIA.—Private advices from Olympia state that owing to the absence of Messrs. Jacobs, Jesse and Page, all members from this country, and all democrats, the radicals are likely to secure control of the House of Representatives.

OFFICIAL PAPERS.—The publication of the U. S. laws for Idaho Territory, has been awarded to the Boise Statesman and Idaho World. This is what may be called an even divide—the World representing the democracy, and the Statesman the radicals.

CONGRESSMEN.—At a special election for Congressmen from Thurston and Lewis counties, Wm. Mitchell, the Administration candidate, had a majority of 21 over George A. Barnes, his radical opponent.

COLUMBIA PRESS.—This is the name of a new paper, the publication of which has just been commenced at Umatilla, Oregon. The Press is fiercely democratic, and is ably edited. Messrs. Avery & Dow are the editors and publishers.

THE PACIFIC TRIBUNE thinks it a foregone conclusion that A. A. Denny will be nominated for re-election to Congress. The Tribune forgets that lightning never strikes twice in the same place.

THE STATESMAN, as published on our first page, is copied from the Oregonian.

A Bluff Game.

On reading the telegraphic dispatches from the East, the conviction is irresistible that the radicals in Congress are playing a game of "bluff." The pardoning power, as it applies to rebels, is to be taken away from the President, and according to the radical programme, we are to have justice without mercy.

THE QUESTION of removals from office will bear investigation, but even on an issue of this kind the present Congress is scarcely in a mood to legislate wisely. At a proper time, we doubt not it would be well to make the tenure of office dependent upon good behavior; but the country will scarcely consent to a regulation of this character so long as the offices are mainly in the hands of "shoddy" patriots.

THE ENGLISH monarchy survived the assaults so graphically described by Macaulay, and we are quite sure that the mad caps who now rule in Congress will find their efforts to destroy the Great Republic equally futile.

THE WHOLE theory of our institutions is that of a representative government, and if ten States can be denied representation, there is no good reason why other States cannot be proscribed, until in the end republican government has ceased to exist.

COLVILLE MAIL.—We understand that the present contractors will decline to carry the Colville mail on and after January 1st, 1867. Reason assigned inadequacy of compensation—\$4,000 per annum.

New Territorial Organization.

FOR WEEKS back the Oregon papers, with one or two exceptions, have been engaged in discussing the question of a change in the State boundaries. It is felt that there is no bond of sympathy between Western and Eastern Oregon; and recognizing this fact, it is proposed to sever the unnatural connection.

THE PEOPLE of the Sound country, if left to themselves, we are satisfied, will favor the measure, but with the politicians it is a different matter. With them it involves a surrender of power. Merged in Oregon, the men who now write Governor and other high sounding titles after their names would be left out in the cold, all their power and influence being swallowed up by the still greater magnates who hold sway in the Willamette Valley.

THE PEOPLE of Northern Idaho, we are assured, favor the measure; and speaking for Washington Territory east of the Mountains, we are warranted in saying that such is the unanimous desire of the people.

THERE are many reasons that might be adduced in favor of the proposed change. The people of this Valley, when they have business before the Supreme Court are compelled to go all the way to Olympia, a distance by the traveled route of full three hundred miles.

Letter from the Dalles.

DALLES, Dec. 8, 1866. PROSPECTS OF WALLA WALLA. EDITOR STATESMAN:—From a gentleman who has just returned from the upper country, I learn that Walla Walla is in a flourishing condition, trade good, houses going up like magic, and that everything betokens prosperity.

BY A private letter written at Canyon City, and received by last stage, I am informed that the red devils have again resumed their hellish work of murder and robbery. Hopes were entertained, that as soon as troops were quartered at the different posts on the Dalles and Canyon road, our people would no longer be startled by Indian depredations; but, judging by the following, our red neighbors seem to entirely disregard the presence of soldiers.

ABOUT ONE week ago, "Lo" ventured within six miles of Canyon City, killed one of the best young men in that neighborhood, and drove off a respectable lot of animals. This was followed up to within half a mile of Canyon, where Mr. "Lo" had the impudence to knock at a house occupied by a small family.

THE GREAT "Overland stage" left the Dalles on Monday last, carrying the United States mails. I understand that the stages between Walla Walla and the Dalles will soon make daily trips.

EDITOR STATESMAN:—The allusion in the last issue of your paper to a public building, so much needed in our city, will scarcely escape the notice of your readers. A town hall located where the Masonic Hall used to stand would, no doubt, soon repay to the city and county the money invested.

SPEAKING of ornaments, four years ago, the little M. E. Church, with its snow white steeple and clear sounding bell, was looked upon with honor by both citizens and strangers, as the edifice of God and his people, but to-day it stands forsaken, mournful and decaying.

MURDER AT HENDERSHOT'S POINT. GRAND JURY VALLEY, Dec. 9th, 1866. EDITOR STATESMAN:—Last evening, about 5 o'clock, William A. Polk was shot and killed by Thomas Martin. The parties had a difficulty on the morning in regard to a settlement for labor and money loaned.

The Political Deadlock.

THE TWO parties which measured their strength against each other in the late elections, says the N. Y. World, had each a clearly-defined affirmative policy. The affirmative policy of the republicans was their proposed constitutional amendment; that of the democrats, the right of all the States to immediate representation in Congress.

IF THE opponents of admission have a majority of the people of one section, the opponents of the amendment have a majority of the people of the whole country, and therefore superior physical strength, if the controversy should be pushed to extremities. Looking to the future, thirteen States can block the amendment forever, (the number of States being likely never to reach fifty-two); while the republican strength in Congress is subject to the contingencies of every biennial election.

THEY would only half extricate themselves by impeaching and deposing the President. They would also have to impeach and oust the judges of the Supreme Court, before they could force their amendments on the country.

Ordinance No. 31.

An Ordinance in relation to building Bulkheads on Mill Creek. Sec. 1. The people of the City of Walla Walla do ordain as follows, to wit: that all owners of lots situated on the line of Mill Creek and on each side of the same within the limits of the City of Walla Walla, shall build a Bulkhead within said lots and on a line and in conformity with Bulkheads already built, and now being built, at the crossing of First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth streets.

Sec. 2. All owners of lots on said line of Mill Creek, shall build said Bulkheads as described in Section 1, within Fifteen days after being duly notified by the City Clerk.

Sec. 3. If the owner of any property situated as aforesaid shall fail or refuse to build said Bulkheads after having been duly notified, it shall be the duty of the City to build or cause to be built the same at the expense and cost of the owner of said property, and it shall be the duty of the City Clerk to forthwith advertise said property for sale as public auction, by publishing the notice thereof in the Walla Walla Statesman, and by posting up three copies of such notice in the City, and he shall proceed to sell the same as aforesaid, fifteen days after the date of said notice, and shall receive such fees as are allowed Sheriffs on sales for taxes for his services.

Sec. 4. If any property shall be sold as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of the City Clerk to issue a certificate of sale to the purchaser, and if the same shall not be redeemed as aforesaid within a piousity days, he shall then issue a deed to the purchaser of the property. Said deed shall be signed by the Mayor of the City and the President of the Common Council and attested by the City Clerk.

Sec. 5. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its passage. Passed Dec. 13, 1866. J. W. McKee, Pres't. E. B. Whitman, Mayor.
