

Editorial Ink-Drops.

PORTLAND, April 24, 1862.

Portland is really beginning to assume the consequential airs of a city. Its many massive brick buildings, its stone sidewalks, and the hurried gait of its inhabitants, all suggest the inference that her onward march is irresistible.

I find considerable inquiry respecting Walla Walla, suggested no doubt by a series of articles which lately appeared in the Times, attributing the riot at the Theater to secession influences.

If politics were ever mixed in this locality, they are decidedly so now. They have two kinds of Union men here and two kinds of secessionists. Democrats are Union men, republicans are Union men; democrats are secessionists, republicans are secessionists; and the beauty of the thing is, they are every one of them the very best of Union men.

Some considerable dissatisfaction is expressed at the Union nominations, and the result of the election is considered doubtful by some of the knowing ones. The Oregon Statesman has found a measure man than Sam May in the State, and that man is May's opponent for Secretary of State.

Looking over the field, it strikes one forcibly that office and spoils are as usual, the great desideratum. There is but little patriotism about the whole affair.

The nomination for officers of this county will be made in a few days. There are already enough candidates in the field to supply a dozen counties.

With bated breath and whispering humbleness, we address the voter. A large emigration of disaffected office-seekers may be expected soon in the upper country.

LATEST ATLANTIC NEWS.

The following dispatches are from the Sacramento Union of the 17th ult. CAIRO, April 11.—Seven hundred wounded from Pittsburgh, arrived in the Mound City last night.

Washington Statesman.

AMUSEMENTS.—In the way of amusements, our citizens, during the week, have been treated with a little "spice" in the shape of variety. On Saturday and Monday evening, Mr. John Kelly gave musical entertainments at the Theater. On Tuesday evening, Mr. J. G. Kenyon, ventriloquist and magician, gave exhibitions. The benefit tendered by the citizens to Mr. J. B. Robinson took place on Wednesday night, on which occasion the audience was unusually large, and the performance passed off to the entire satisfaction of all present. Mr. Kenyon added to the interest of the entertainment by ventriloquist imitations and "tricks of magic."

TO PROSPECTORS.—It is a fact that should be kept before the prospector that gold has been found on the headwaters of some of the streams along the trail from this valley to the Grand Ronde. It is generally believed by old residents here that a thorough prospecting of these streams will result in the discovery of paying diggings on this side of the Blue mountains. Miners on their way to Powder river would do well to prospect these streams.

VOLUNTEER CROPS.—We are informed that a goodly portion of this year's crops in this valley will be "volunteer." This, in part, results from necessity. Two things, the back-ardness of the spring and the extraordinary high price of seed grain, have conspired to bring about this result. Farmers tell us that the "volunteer crops" in this valley have heretofore been nearly equal to those regularly sown, and where the lands have not been pastured down closely, their present crops promise as abundant a yield as heretofore.

FOUND.—A mail which was sent from the post office in this city, April 18, 1861, and lost on its way down to the Dalles, was found on the 18th ult. by Mr. John Conron, seven miles west of John Day's river. The mail was still in good condition, and has been forwarded by the postmaster to the Dead Letter office. Many an anxious writer has no doubt wondered why he never received an answer to a letter sent out by that mail.

OFFICERS OF IDAHO COUNTY.—A correspondent writing from Florence, requests us to publish the list of officers for Idaho county, stating that the people there are yet uninformed as to who their officers are. The list is as follows: County Auditor, S. Lindsey; Sheriff, Jefferson Stander; Commissioners, Robert Gray, Robert Burns and Sanborn; Justice of the Peace, Parker. We publish the list as it appears on the statute, and presume the citizens of Idaho can determine who Sanborn and Parker are. The appointments will hold their offices until the general election in July.

HIGH WATERS.—The late warm weather has melted the snow in the mountains and the streams throughout the valley are very high—almost impassable. We are informed by old residents that the rise of this season has come much earlier than usual, and per consequence it is argued that the season for navigating the rivers in the upper country will be proportionally shortened. The Columbia and Snake rivers are rising very rapidly.

FOR SALMON.—The Yreka Journal of recent date, says a large number of emigrants—many of them with their families—have passed through Shasta Valley, on their way to Salmon. They are bringing wagons with them, and come via Klamath Lake. The same paper further states that it is estimated that there are near three thousand Salmon-bound emigrants on the road between that place and Sacramento.

WEEKLY TRIPS.—Report says the steamers will, for a few weeks to come, only make weekly trips from Des-butes to Wallula, on account of being unable to obtain a sufficient supply of wood for their regular trips. The cold winter has prevented contractors from fulfilling their contracts with the company to furnish them wood; hence the scarcity of the article now.

SUPPLIES FOR THE MINES.—Judging from the large number of pack trains that have left this city during the week for Salmon river there will be no lack of supplies in the mines in two or three weeks more. From the great number of pack trains, however, packers will necessarily be kept very busy this summer in keeping up this supply and getting in a surplus for next winter.

PERSONAL.—Mr. E. W. Tracy, Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Agent for Oregon and Washington, is now on a visit to our city, perfecting arrangements for the better conveyance of the express and superintending other matters pertaining to the interests of the company in the upper country.

CATTLE FOR SALMON.—Mr. W. C. Hull, of Portland, passed through this city on Tuesday with a drove of cattle for the Salmon market. Mr. H. informs us that he has two or three more droves now on the road. They will be driven direct through to the mines.

CAMAS PRAIRIE.—We are informed by Mr. Mossman that this prairie, on the road to Salmon, which was supposed last fall would be almost impassable this spring, is now nearly dry, and the road over it as good as any from here to Salmon river.

CITY ORDINANCES.

AN ORDINANCE, defining the duties of the City Assessor, for the City of Walla Walla, W. T.

The people of the city of Walla Walla do ordain as follows: SECTION 1st. That it shall be the duty of the City Assessor, before entering upon the discharge of the duties connected with his office, to give a bond to the people of the city of Walla Walla, in the penal sum of one thousand dollars, with two or more sureties, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties according to law, and to make and collect an oath of office according to law, and to the best of his ability.

Sec. 2d. The said Assessor shall, on the 25th day of April, 1862, and on the second Tuesday in April, in each succeeding year, commence to ascertain the names of all persons in said city liable to taxation, and also all the taxable property therein, and shall prepare an assessment roll, in which shall be set down, in separate columns, 1st. The names of taxable persons in said city. 2d. The value of the personal property taxable to each. And when any person is assessed as trustee, guardian, executor, or administrator, a designation of the representative character shall be added to his name, and such assessment shall be entered in a separate class from the individual assessment.

Sec. 3d. The Assessor may require any person liable to taxation in said city to furnish a list of all his property liable to taxation, and may require such person to make oath that such list contains a full and true account of all such property, so belonging to him, and if any person refuse to furnish such list, or swear to the same—when required to do so by the Assessor—the Assessor shall ascertain the taxable property of any such person, from the best information to be derived from other sources; and shall enter such refusal to furnish a list, or to swear or affirm, upon his roll.

Sec. 4. The Assessor shall return the assessment roll to the Board of Common Council within five days after the commencement of the assessment, as heretofore provided.

Sec. 5. The improvements upon the lots and blocks of said city shall be assessed as personal property.

Sec. 6. The Assessor shall receive a compensation of five (\$5) dollars per day, for each day actually and

necessarily employed in the discharge of the duties of his office, and such reasonable compensation for the copy of the assessment roll as the Board of Common Council may allow; and he shall be entitled to receive out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated. This ordinance to be in force from and after the 23d day of April, 1862.

AN ORDINANCE, defining the duties of the City Treasurer of the city of Walla Walla, W. T.

The people of the city of Walla Walla do ordain as follows: SECTION 1. That the City Treasurer, before entering upon the discharge of the duties connected with his office, shall give a bond to the people of the city of Walla Walla, in the penal sum of one thousand dollars, with at least two sureties, which bond shall be approved by the Board of Common Council, and conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties according to law. He shall also take and subscribe an oath to the effect that he will faithfully perform said duties in accordance with law.

Sec. 2. He shall receive all moneys due and accruing to the city, and disburse the same upon the warrants of the President of the Council, countersigned by the Mayor.

Sec. 3. He shall keep his office open for the transaction of business, during business hours, and he shall arrange and keep his books that the amount received and paid out, an account of separate and distinct funds, or specific appropriations, shall be exhibited in separate accounts, as well as the whole receipts and expenditures by the general account.

Sec. 4. All persons liable to taxes, shall be exhibited in books subject to the inspection of the Mayor, and shall on the first Monday of January, April, July and October of each year, make out and present to the Mayor, a full and complete statement of the receipts and expenditures of the preceding three months.

Sec. 5. The Mayor shall appoint one of the President of the Board of Common Council, countersigned by the Mayor, when presented, if there is money in the treasury, to make out and present to the Mayor, a list of all the funds, and the date of such presentation or his signature.

Sec. 6. The City Assessor shall be removed by the Treasurer, according to the priority of the time of presentation. Provided, such orders, payable out of the city treasury, shall be paid, and the City Assessor, without regard to priority of presentation or number, but the said Treasurer shall not pay any balance hereof, until he has received from the Mayor, an order of the Mayor, and the date of such presentation or his signature.

Sec. 7. The City Treasurer shall annually make a complete report to the Board of Common Council, on or before the 1st day of January, of each year, of all moneys which may come into the treasury.

This ordinance to be in force from and after the 23d day of April, 1862.

AN ORDINANCE, to provide for the assessing and collecting of city taxes.

The people of the city of Walla Walla do ordain as follows: SECTION 1. That all property within the corporate limits of the city of Walla Walla, made taxable by law for territorial and county purposes, shall be taxed for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the city government; said tax to be paid in equal and ratable proportion by the owners or said property, and to be assessed and determined by the Board of Common Council, as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. All personal property belonging to any religious association, or to any school, literary, scientific or benevolent institution, or invested for the use of the same, or held by trustees—all personal property excepted from taxation.

Sec. 3. Whenever any person shall be occupying and claiming any lands within said city, by virtue of the laws of the United States, granting lands to actual settlers therein, the improvements shall be valued as part of the personal property of said person occupying the same.

Sec. 4. All taxes shall be assessed in accordance with an ordinance passed in relation to the duties of a City Assessor.

Sec. 5. The Board of Common Council, upon the receipt of the assessment roll from the City Assessor, shall determine the amount of taxes necessary to be collected for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the city government, and apportion the same.

Sec. 6. When the amount of the foregoing section shall have been complied with, the assessment roll shall be passed over to the City Treasurer, within ten days after the assessment roll has been placed in the hands of the City Treasurer, pay to the said Treasurer the amount of taxes due, and receive a receipt therefor in payment of city taxes, upon amount not exceeding such tax. The Treasurer shall give a receipt for the amount of personal property upon which the same is paid, and shall note in his roll the payment of the same.

Sec. 7. The City Treasurer shall, within ten days after the expiration of the time allowed for the payment of taxes, make out a schedule of unpaid taxes in the form of a duplicate assessment roll, verified by affidavit, and deliver the same to the Clerk of the Board of Common Council, who shall cause the same to be published in a newspaper published in this city, for the amount of such unpaid taxes, and forthwith issue a transcript of such schedule, with the ten (10) per cent added, to the City Assessor, with a warrant attached thereto, in the name of the United States, under his hand, and the seal of the Board of Common Council, commanding the assessor to sell the property charged in such transcript, by demanding payment of the same from the persons chargeable therein, and making sale of the goods and chattels of said person, if refused, in the manner hereinafter provided, and to return said assessment roll to the said Clerk within thirty (30) days from the date when he received the same.

Sec. 8. The Assessor shall call on each person named in the transcript of the taxes charged, as provided in this act, and if not then paid, shall try the same on the goods and chattels of such person, and give notice of the same, and the property to be sold, by posting up advertisements in four or five places in the said city, and sell the same at public auction, for cash, and if the same do not sell for more than the taxes, cost and charges, the surplus shall be paid to the owner thereof, and such assessment roll, with the amount of taxes due, and the fee paid for collection, and in case of sale, the usual fee for the sale, shall be returned to the City Assessor, provided, that any person, before sale of his property, may pay all taxes, charges and costs, and stop up his name.

Sec. 9. Any person who may be aggrieved by an over-assessment on the part of the City Assessor, may within ten days after the assessment roll is completed, make application, in writing, to the Board of Common Council setting forth the particulars of his case, and the same shall be examined into, and if wrong, corrected.

Sec. 10. The Assessor shall pay to the City Treasurer, within ten days after the time when he has received the moneys collected by him and the moneys which may be returned to him upon the assessment roll, the amount of the same to be paid from and after the 23d day of April, 1862.

Nevada Territory. The following extract, a truthful and graphic description of the geographic and physical peculiarities of the "Silver Land" is taken from "Sketches of the Washoe Silver Mines" by Doct. DeGroot. It is a region of varied geology and strong meteorological characteristics—a land of contrasts extremes and apparent contradictions; of mingled barrenness and fertility, beauty and desolation, aridity and storm. Growing side by side, is the caucian and the wild plum, while issuing almost from the same orifice are hot springs and cold; the waters of the one pure and healthful; of the other, nauseating and unwholesome.

In passing over this strange country one is impressed with the idea that he has come too soon. Everything seems crude and unfinished about him; all nature wears a primitive aspect. The rocks, the vegetation—all things are in a transition state. The traveler feels as if he has intruded upon the solitudes of nature before she has fitted them for his reception, or adapted them to the wants of civilized man. The flats which she had platted out for future meadows, and was slowly filling up by freighting the melted snows with debris from the mountains, are as yet but half finished, being only wide-extended marshes or yielding mud lakes. The sage plain, to which the great alchemist was patiently imparting the elements of fruitfulness, drawn from the generous air and the grudging rocks, has arrived only at a central point between utter barrenness and a dubious vegetation—the lichen and the artemisia struggling for subsistence—the lowly pioneers of coming fertility. The summits of the once splintered mountains, rounded into domes by the slow process of disintegration, have come to be plated with the stunted cedar, and their sides to be sown with the wild grass-seeds; which, though they afford ample covert for the hare, and a scanty pasture for the deer, are little fit for the pursuits of the agriculturist or the habits of the white man.

All except a few valleys and mountain meadows, is a wilderness, silent and vacant, over which the mirage dances, and the sand storm sweeps—the one warning the weary emigrant to hasten his footsteps; the other luring him from his path and beguiling him to death. This optical illusion, caused by the reflection of the sun's rays upon the saline particles floating in the atmosphere, is common only in desert regions, where it tantalizes the thirsty traveler with the sight of palatial structures and limpid waters, all of which dissolve into burning air as he approaches the spot of their supposed existence.
