The News.

Our Eastern dates this week are up to the 22d. The New York riot had subsided and enrollment under the conscription act was being enforced.

Morgan's Indiana raid luckily proved a total failure. At last accounts he had deserted his command with a small squad.

Lee is reported falling back on Richmond, while the Army of the Potomac is following him up.

The immediate fortunes of the Confederacy depend much upon conscription. If Davis' proclamation calling for all persons between the ages of 18 and 45 to be enlisted, meets with much success...

The news from the south-west still continues favorable. Port Hudson was surrendered on the 8th of July with some 13,000 prisoners.

Washington, July 18.—The Union troops encountered Morgan's force in Jackson, near the Ohio, this afternoon.

Chicago, July 18.—A letter in the Boston Journal dated "Off Charleston, 10th," says the great final attack was on Tuesday, 14th, and added that everything was working well.

Washington, July 18.—From rebel sources we have reports of the rebellion between the Federal and Jackson, Miss. Late reports say the Federals are shelling the city, and had killed several soldiers and civilians.

Chicago, July 21.—The following was received at his quarters last night: We closed John Morgan and his command over fifty miles to-day, after heavy skirmishing for six or seven miles.

Late Eastern News.

New York, July 20.—The disturbances in this city have been quieted. Railroad tracks have been re-laid; telegraph lines repaired, and business has been resumed.

Washington, July 16.—The draft in New York is only temporarily suspended and will probably be resumed as soon as order is restored.

New York, July 17th.—Washington dispatches dated last night says the Abby's Gap has been captured by 300 or 400 rebels.
