

LOST, STRAYED OR TAKEN WITHOUT PERMISSION.—We understand that some large pumpkins were sent down from Walla Walla to be forwarded to the State Fair...

The articles referred to were squashes, not pumpkins. The papers of the lower country complain loudly about the lawlessness of Walla Walla "accessories," but we'll wager a squash against one of their big red apples that we have no citizens up here—scetch or not—who would be mean enough to steal a squash.

MILITARY POSTS.—The attention of the Government should be called to the necessity of establishing permanent military posts at Forts Hall and Boise, for the protection of emigrants. Expeditions like the one sent out the present season can be of but little service in that way, as they necessarily spend most of their time in going and coming.

"WHITE INDIANS."—It is the opinion of many of the emigrants that a party of whites have been engaged with the Indians in the late murders of emigrants in the vicinity of Fort Hall and on Raft and Rock rivers. In one instance, they got some fifteen thousand dollars from emigrants whom they murdered.

INCORRECT.—The report published last week in relation to the Indian massacre at Mormon Basin proved to be a fabrication. The people of Auburn have a proper good way of punishing offenders, and they would be perfectly justifiable in disposing of the individual in a "summary manner" who started this story.

WAR COUNCIL.—The Snake, Bannock and a portion of the disaffected Nez Percé Indians are now holding a grand Council at Fort Hall, ostensibly to consider the propriety of a war with the Blackfeet; but it is the opinion of many that it is a combination against the whites.

PERSONAL.—Mr. J. C. Franklin, of Mossman & Co.'s express, called on us yesterday. Himself a "knight of the shears," he is not unamiable of the wants of the printer, and did not fail to bring along a file of the P. C. A. and other useful papers.

STOLEN ANIMALS.—The Indians on Camas Prairie, near Fort Hall, have some two or three hundred animals—horses and mules—taken from the Overland Mail Company. They traded some of this stock to the emigrants coming through.

A "CALIFORNIA SPECIMEN."—A specimen of gold bearing quartz weighing two and a half pounds was found at Mormon Basin, last week. The specimen contained one hundred and ninety-eight dollars of pure gold.

CONVICTED.—James A. Waller, for the murder of Griffin, on Powder river, last spring, was convicted of murder in the second degree at the late term of the Washington county court and sentenced to the penitentiary for life.

FALL STOCKS.—Our merchants generally are now receiving their fall stocks of goods, and in all appearances will be abundantly able to meet the large demands that will be made upon them this fall and winter from the mining districts.

WINTERING.—The high peaks of the Blue mountains were for the first time this season covered with snow on Wednesday morning.

SPECIAL AGENT.—Mr. W. P. Huntington has been appointed by Superintendent Rector special Indian Agent for the Umatilla reservation, vice Wm. H. Barnhart.

STOCK.—About seven thousand head of stock have been brought into Washington and Oregon this year via the plains, by the emigrants.

CRAWFORD'S ESCORT.—Capt. Crawford's escort were camped on the Owyhee river on the 24th of September. They expected to be in Walla Walla by the middle of the present month.

THE U. S. Sanitary Committee of San Francisco sent one hundred thousand dollars to the east, for the relief of suffering soldiers, by the steamer of the 20th ult.

OVERLAND MAIL.—The Postmaster at Sacramento has received instructions from the Postmaster General to send the Atlantic mails overland.

INCREASING.—Business of every description is now on the increase in our city, and no complaints of dull times are heard from any quarter.

A boy and girl of tender years were disputing as to what their mothers could do. Getting impatient, the little damsel blurted out, by way of a climax and a clincher:—"Well there is one thing my mother can do that yours can't—my mother can take every one of her teeth out at once."

BRECKENRIDGE.—Breckenridge's sword, with his name engraved on it was captured at Baton Rouge. This may have given rise to the report that he lost his right arm, as most men would not leave their sword while they had an arm to wield it.

DRAFTING.—The *modus operandi* of drafting is of late becoming of interest. It is as follows: The names borne on the rolls is decided to draw upon, whether of organized companies or regiments, or of the able-bodied, arms bearing citizens, are taken by lot, in the presence of prescribed officials; the persons drawn are notified and given opportunity to prove themselves exempt, or provide acceptable substitutes, falling in which they are compelled to serve, or submit to heavy penalties, generally imprisonment.
