

The Oregonian special correspondent at Olympia says in print that during the senatorial deal Squire promised the Yakima land office to four different men.

The present incumbents are: Thomas M. Vance, who is well liked, much respected, and against whom there is no taint of collusion nor favoritism in decisions, nor use of the powers of office for private inquests by beneficiaries.

Neither officer has completed his term, but at least one and probably both are destined to be superseded in the near future.

Mr. Krutz recognizes that his official life will be short and that the regrets will be few and far between. The breeze will keep the skirts of his coat in a horizontal position in his haste to get to new fields after being superseded.

Mr. Vance will bow to the exigencies of political life and remain with us to practice his profession of law, in which he is well qualified by education and natural talent to take high rank.

Register Krutz and Receiver Vance will be succeeded by republicans. One will come from Kittitas county and one from Yakima.

There is little doubt but what Dr. W. H. Hare will be the favored son from the northern half of this land district. He has been a faithful and consistent laborer in the republican vineyard and his efforts are recognized.

As yet there is nothing definite as to whom the appointee from Yakima will be. No one has made personal application for the position, although it is said that weighty endorsements are in the hands of Washington's senators and representatives favoring one of our leading and most respected citizens.

REPRESENTATIVE DAVIS SUCCESSOR.

The vacancy in the state house of representatives caused by the death of Mr. Davis, of Kittitas, is to be filled by special election on the 7th of February.

As far as THE HERALD is able to learn, the nomination will probably fall to Mr. Sam Vinson, of Roslyn. Mr. Vinson was at one time a resident of Yakima, and, notwithstanding his change of base to the fair field of Kittitas, his many friends here, who recognize his good qualifications and talents, wish him well and will congratulate the people of our sister county if they secure the services of so active and competent a representative.

Mr. Vinson has been a resident of this state for twelve years, and has been an active, ardent and consistent worker for democracy. He has never asked for office, and will only accept in this instance if the tender of the nomination meets with the unanimous wishes of the central committee.

THE NORTH YAKIMA PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Supintendent E. P. Greene Addresses the School Patrons—Statistics of Attendance—The Roll of Honor.

To the Patrons of the North Yakima Schools: I had intended preparing for publication in the holiday vacation a general report of our schools during the first three months, but sickness and an unavoidable delay in getting my records and other office work into proper shape have prevented my doing so until now.

The total absence of 685 1/2 days I almost blush to publish. I must state, also, that when pupils are absent to exceed three days in succession they are marked "left," and that such absence isn't counted, as the pupils are not treated as "belonging."

There are a few names on our records that inspire me with courage and are the names of pupils perfect in attendance for the three months, and are as follows: Central—Carl Cox, Nora Livesley, Maude Steiner, Blanche Feuerbach, Olive Fry, Pearl McMurray, Lulu Dunn, Dana Dunn, Ella Clark, Bessie Lippincott, Harry Jacobs, Charles Wavrunek, George Dunn, George McDaniel and Addie Wavrunek, a total of 16 out of 205 enrolled.

At the Columbia building the record is 257, 139 at the Central and 218 at the Columbia. This is another hindrance to effective school work, for which teachers feel they are not responsible.

When I took charge of the schools I was informed by the board of directors that they wished the schools graded in accordance with some definite system and a progressive course of study prepared. This I did to the best of my ability, providing for primary and grammar departments of four grades each and a high school course of three years.

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Within a few days you will receive a printed copy of the rules, regulations, system of grading and course of study mentioned above. Please preserve it, look it over often, and render us all the assistance in your power to keep your pupils moving along smoothly from grade to grade.

Yours cordially invited to visit any room at any time and inspect our work. You cannot come too often for your good or the good of your children.
