STATE LAND CRUISERS.

Six Agents Are Appointed to Select Granted Lands.

Governor Ferry has appointed the following named agents to cruise and select lands for the state James McIntosh, Olympia; I. A. Navarre, Lake Chelan; H. N. Price, Skamokawa; L. D. W. Shelton, Seattle; J. F. Roberts, Spokane; Charles W. Geiger, Chehalis.

It will be the duty of these agents to inspect public lands under the supervision of the state land commission and report to the commission the character and value of the lands examined and the value of timber thereon.

The lands entered will be apportioned to the various grants, so that each grant will receive lands of as nearly equal value as possible.

The statute under which the agents are appointed provides that their compensation may be ten cents per acre of lands cruised, but as such a fee would amount to an average compensation of \$10,000 each, Governor Ferry has devised a plan for their employment at a stated monthly salary, which will result in a great saving to the state.

No appropriation was made by the legislature for the pay of the agents, but the law providing for their employment authorizes the issuance to them by the auditor of warrants for the amount of their compensation. Such warrants will be issued, and the next legislature is expected to make an appropriation for their payment as a matter of course.

THRIVES OF THE HOP LOUSE.

An Insect That Will Destroy the Great Vine Pest.

Seattle Telegram: An important discovery has been made by James Wilson, foreman of the Shaw & Alger hop ranch, near this city, who has found a little insect which devours the hop louse at work on the leaves. The insect not only eats the louse, but it also destroys the eggs, and if put in hop fields in sufficient quantities will do for the hop growers what the Australian lady bug did for the orange growers in southern California, and consume the louse like the latter did the scale.

A specimen of the insect was sent to the telegraph office by Mr. Wilson, and yesterday it was submitted to Prof. O. B. Johnson of the state university, together with the hop leaf which had been infested with the louse, but when the professor put it under a microscope not a trace of the louse eggs could be found, the worm or insect having stripped the leaf clean.

The insect, the professor stated, is not an uncommon one, but is of incalculable value in all vine growing districts. It is a sort of an antlion and of the family known to entomologists as neuroptera, which live entirely upon insects. It is the larva of what is classified as the chrysope (golden eye), and in time joins the army of what is known as the lace-winged fly. As a worm it preys mainly upon plant and vine lice. It has six legs on each side and claws or nippers leading from the mouth which are not unlike the claws or feelers of a crab or lobster.

To what extent the insect destroyer exists here is not known, but if the species can be extensively propagated it is said that it will be a boon to our hop and vine growers.
