On behalf of the Office of the Secretary of State, thank you for participating in our democratic process. I am pleased to present the 2022 General Election Voters’ Pamphlet to help you make informed decisions as you exercise your right to vote. This guide includes information about voting, and the candidates and measures that appear on your ballot.

Before you can participate, you must be registered to vote. Voter registration forms that are mailed or completed online must be received by Oct. 31, and we encourage you to review your registration information today at **VoteWA.gov**. After Oct. 31, you must visit an elections office or voting center during regular business hours or until 8 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 8, to register to vote or update your registration and receive a ballot.

After you have voted your ballot, be sure to sign the return envelope. Your signature is important because election officials check that your signature matches the one on your voter registration record before they count your ballot. Next, return your ballot. If returning by U.S. mail — no postage needed — remember that ballots must be postmarked by Nov. 8 in order to be counted. You can also use an official ballot drop box anywhere in the state. Drop boxes are open until 8 p.m. on Election Day. Check **VoteWA.gov** to locate a ballot drop box or see the status of your ballot.

By voting, you are making your voice heard.

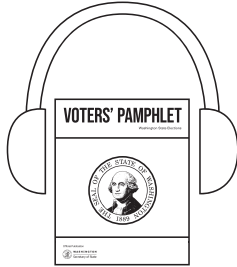

Qualifications

To vote, you must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, a resident of Washington, and not currently serving a sentence of total confinement in prison.



If you're 16 or 17 years old, you can sign up as a Future Voter and be automatically registered to vote when you qualify.

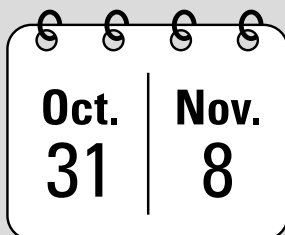

Registration deadlines



By mail or online: Your application must be received no later than October 31.

In person: Visit a local voting center no later than 8 p.m. on November 8.

Check your registration info at VoteWA.gov.

Moved? Update your voting address

Contact a county elections office to request a ballot at your new address.



By October 31: Have your application received by mail or updated online.

Or

By November 8: Visit a local voting center in person.

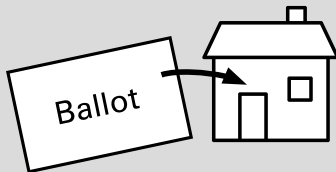
Sign up online at VoteWA.gov with your Washington state driver's license, permit or ID. Or, you can fill out a paper registration form using the last four digits of your Social Security number and mail it in. You'll be automatically registered to vote when you qualify.

Every January on Temperance and Good Citizenship Day, high school students 16 and older have the opportunity to complete a voter registration form in class.

How do I vote and return my ballot?

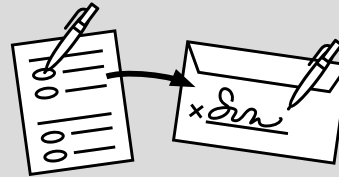

If you're registered to vote, there is no need to request a ballot. Your ballot will be mailed by **October 21** to the address you provide on your voter registration. If you need a replacement ballot, contact a county elections office listed at the end of this pamphlet.



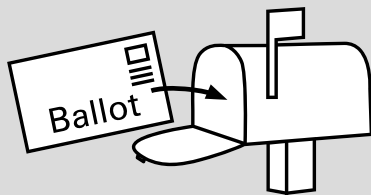

Vote your ballot and sign your return envelope. We need your signature to accept your ballot. You are not required to vote every race on your ballot. We encourage using this pamphlet to help you decide.



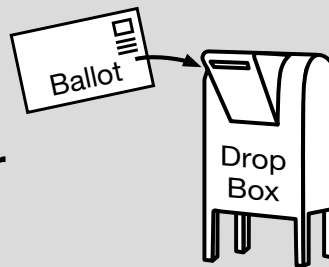

Return your ballot by mail, no stamp needed. If mailed, your ballot must be postmarked by **November 8**. Don't let a late postmark disqualify your ballot. The USPS recommends that you mail a week before Election Day.



Or, return your ballot to an official ballot drop box. Drop boxes are open until 8 p.m. on **November 8**. Find drop box locations at **VoteWA.gov**.

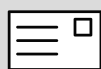

If you cannot personally return your ballot, let only people you trust deliver it for you.

Check the status of your ballot on **VoteWA.gov** to see if it has been received by your county elections office.



Election staff will contact you before your ballot is processed if:

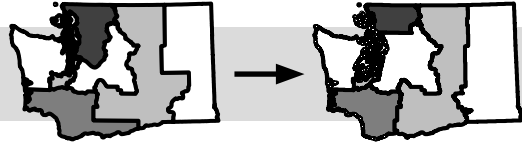
- Your signature is missing
- Your signature doesn't match your voter registration record

View election results online

After 8 p.m. on election night, tallied results from each county are posted at **results.vote.wa.gov**.

Results are updated as counties report and unofficial until certification.

Your district may have changed



Every 10 years, following the U.S. Census, legislative and congressional district boundaries are redrawn in a process called redistricting.

Redistricting ensures that each district has about the same number of people, which means equal representation in government.

As a result of redistricting, you may have been assigned to a new legislative or congressional district.

If you have changed districts, you will vote on different legislative or congressional races, beginning this year.

How do I know if something is true?

When reviewing online or printed information, think about:

- Who made this, and who is it for?
- Why did they make it?
- When was this made?
- What makes it believable?
- How might other people read this message?
- Ask the experts — consult a fact-checking site or ask an official source. Get trusted info from your county auditor or elections office.

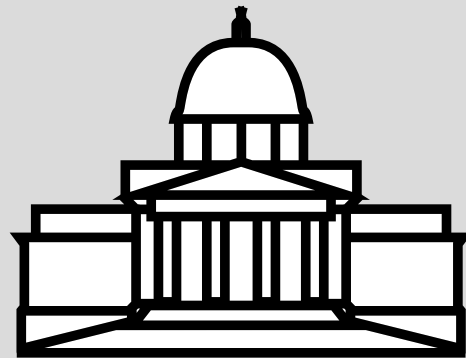


i Advisory votes are the result of Initiative 960, approved by voters in 2007. The Office of the Secretary of State publishes the Attorney General's advisory vote description according to RCW 29A.72.283.

You are advising the Legislature if you do or do not favor a tax increase passed during the recent legislative session.

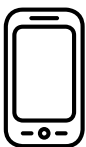
Repeal — means you **don't favor** the tax increase.

Engrossed Substitute House Bill 2076

The legislature imposed, without a vote of the people, premiums on “transportation network companies” to provide workers compensation to their drivers, costing an indeterminate amount in its first ten years, for government spending.

Engrossed Substitute House Bill 2076 (ESHB 2076)
Narrative Explanation (required for Indeterminate Cash Receipts)
<p>Section 1 requires transportation network companies (TNCs) to remit \$0.15 of every passenger fare quarterly to the newly created Driver Resource Center Fund beginning July 1, 2024. How much is collected will change each January 1 because remittance will be adjusted each year based on inflation. In addition, the Department of Labor & Industries has no way to predict how many passenger fares will be remitted or how many TNCs will be subject to interest and penalties due to failing to remit payments by the deadlines. For these reasons, fiscal impact associated with section 1 is indeterminate.</p> <p>Section 11 of the bill directs L&I to assess premiums for TNC drivers only for hours while the driver is engaged in passenger platform time and dispatch platform time effective January 1, 2023. These premiums would be used for potential future claims and would be deposited in the Accident and Medical Aid Accounts. L&I anticipates that there would be additional claims filed by these workers and L&I would receive additional premiums for this coverage. However, there is not sufficient data on these workers to determine the volume of additional claims or the level of additional premiums. This section of the bill is indeterminate.</p>

If I am a victim of a crime, can I vote safely?

Keep your voting address confidential

You may be able to enroll in the Address Confidentiality Program (ACP) and register as a Protected Records Voter if you are:

- a survivor of domestic violence, sexual assault, trafficking, stalking; or
- a criminal justice participant or election official who is a target for harassment.



To become a Protected Records Voter:

- You meet with a Certified Advocate who can assist with threat assessment, safety planning, and the program application.
- The best time to enroll is when you move or are planning to move to a location that is unknown to the offender and undocumented in public record.

Federal Qualifications & Responsibilities

Except for the President and Vice President, all federal officials elected in Washington must be residents of the state. Only federal offices have age requirements above and beyond being a registered voter.

Congress

The United States' Senate and House of Representatives have equal responsibility for declaring war, maintaining the armed forces, assessing taxes, borrowing money, minting currency, regulating commerce, and making all laws and budgets necessary for the operation of government.

United States Senator

Senators must be at least 30 years old and citizens of the U.S. for at least nine years. Senators serve six-year terms. The Senate has 100 members; two from each state.

The Senate has several exclusive powers, including consenting to treaties, confirming federal appointments made by the President, and trying federal officials impeached by the House of Representatives.

United States Representative

Representatives must be at least 25 years old and citizens of the U.S. for at least seven years. Representatives are not required to be registered voters of their district, but must reside in the state. Representatives serve two-year terms.

The House of Representatives has 435 members, all of whom are up for election in even-numbered years. Each state has a different number of members based on population. After the 2010 Census, Washington was given a 10th Congressional District.

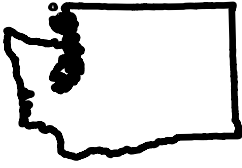

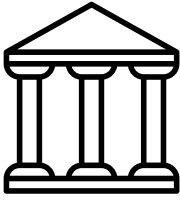

Washington judges are nonpartisan. Judges must be registered Washington voters.

Judges

Judicial candidates must be in good standing to practice law in Washington and are prohibited from statements that appear to commit them on legal issues that may come before them in court.

State Supreme Court Justice

The Washington Supreme Court is the highest judiciary in the state. State Supreme Court justices hear appeals and decide cases from Courts of Appeals and other lower courts. Nine justices are elected statewide to serve six-year terms.

Court of Appeals Judge

Court of Appeals judges hear appeals from Superior Courts. A total of 22 judges serve three divisions headquartered in Seattle, Tacoma, and Spokane. Court of Appeals judges serve six-year terms.

Superior Court Judge

Superior Courts hear felony criminal cases, civil matters, divorces, juvenile cases, and appeals from the lower courts. Superior Courts are organized by county into 30 districts. Superior Court judges serve four-year terms.

Police Station and City Hall Bonds

The Prosser City Council adopted Ordinance No. 22-3187, regarding voter approval for financing certain capital improvements.

If approved, this proposition would authorize financing to replace the City's Police Station and City Hall, including land acquisition, design, construction and equipping of public space for community meetings, public safety, utilities, public works, and other City services. It would authorize issuance of not more than \$16.8 million of general obligation bonds maturing within 31 years payable by the levy of the annual levy of excess property taxes, all as provided in Ordinance No. 22-3187.

Explanatory Statement

Prepared by bond counsel to the City (Stradling Yocca Carlson & Rauth PC)

The City of Prosser is asking voters to decide on a bond measure to fund a replacement for the City Hall and Police Station that were destroyed by fire.

The bonds, together with funds from grants and other sources, would pay to acquire a new site and to construct and equip a new City Hall and Police Station, including spaces for community meetings, public safety, public works, utilities and other city services. The funding package would also pay for the costs of issuing the bonds.

If this measure is approved, no more than \$16.8 million of bonds will be issued. The City will determine when and how much to issue up to that limit. Less debt will be issued if grants and other funding become available. The amount of bonds issued will not exceed the available legal debt capacity for voter-approved debt at the time the bonds are issued.

The annual property taxes necessary to repay the bonds will depend upon interest rates; the timing of the issue and amount of the bonds issued; and changes in property values. The City estimates that if all \$16.8 million of bonds were issued at current market rates, the annual property tax rate would be approximately \$1.085 per \$1,000 of assessed value over the 31-year life of the bonds. For example, additional property taxes on a home assessed at \$350,000 would be about \$379.75 per year.

We represent a coalition of civic minded Prosser citizens who enthusiastically support all of Prosser, except this bond. The proposed bond is not in the best interests of Prosser. Here's why:

Process: The approximate \$20,000,000 city hall / police station project on six acres of riverfront property was created by a city committee of councilmen and employees guided by architectural consultants. The process did not include meaningful public participation.

Finances: The \$16,800,000 construction bond represents an enormous, unnecessary expenditure of taxpayer dollars within our small town. Property owners will be taxed for 31 years with renters and consumers sharing the burden. The Benton County Courthouse is an option which would eliminate the inflated bond. Sharing government buildings and operation costs would save taxpayers millions of dollars. Why no government collaboration? The city wanted to purchase a portion of the already publicly paid for Courthouse. Additionally, the city rejects a mutually supportive relationship with the County to benefit Prosser taxpayers.

Location and Size: The proposed 39,000 square feet of desired interior construction space and six-acre river front campus is grossly inflated for community needs. Further, it places the police station across the river from the established community, and most importantly, four Prosser Schools.

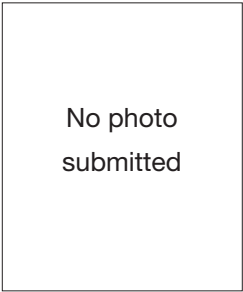

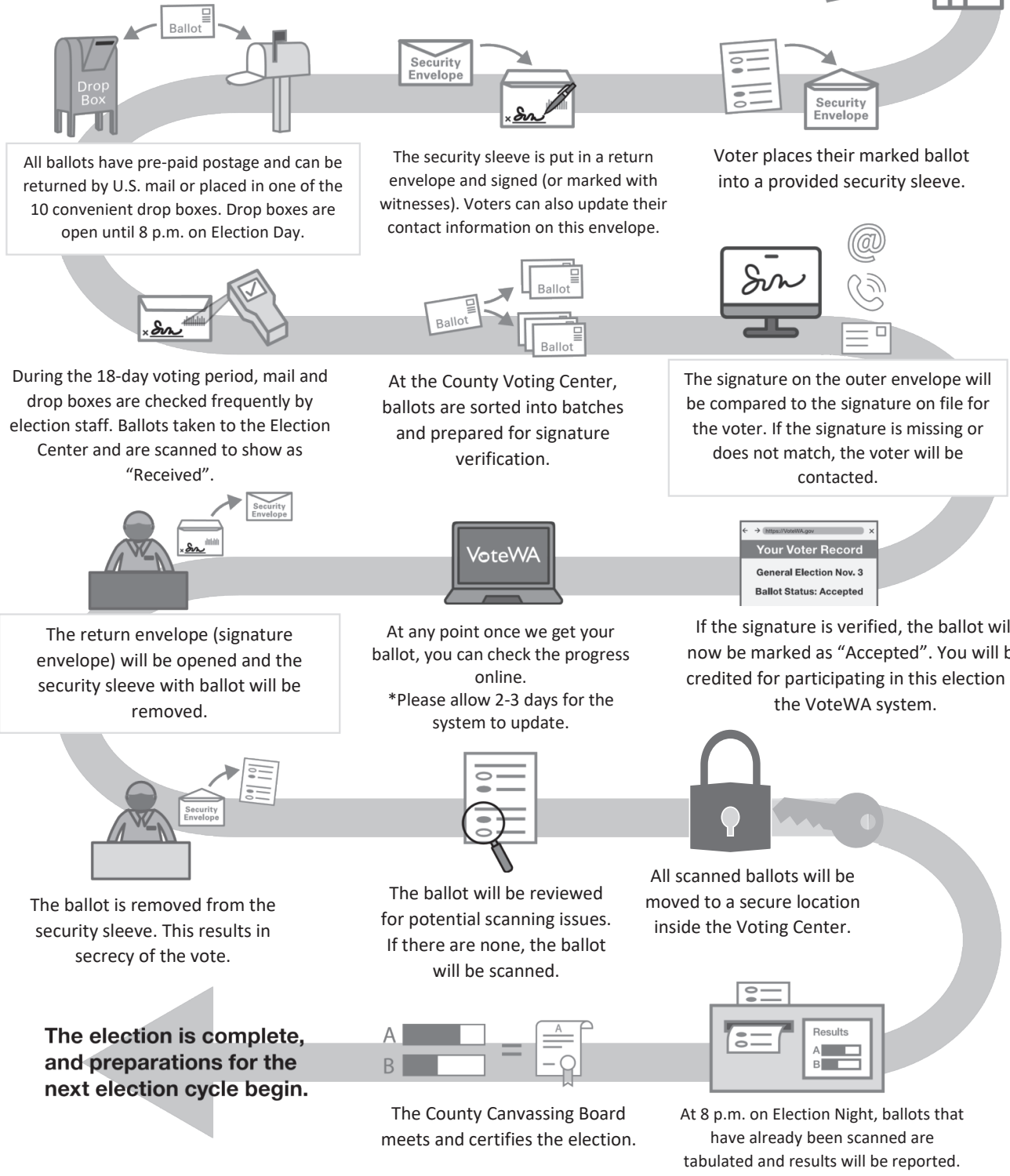

Vote by Mail in Benton County

All eligible voters are sent a ballot at least 18 days prior to the Election Day.



All ballots have pre-paid postage and can be returned by U.S. mail or placed in one of the 10 convenient drop boxes. Drop boxes are open until 8 p.m. on Election Day.

The security sleeve is put in a return envelope and signed (or marked with witnesses). Voters can also update their contact information on this envelope.

Voter places their marked ballot into a provided security sleeve.

During the 18-day voting period, mail and drop boxes are checked frequently by election staff. Ballots taken to the Election Center and are scanned to show as "Received".

At the County Voting Center, ballots are sorted into batches and prepared for signature verification.

The signature on the outer envelope will be compared to the signature on file for the voter. If the signature is missing or does not match, the voter will be contacted.

The return envelope (signature envelope) will be opened and the security sleeve with ballot will be removed.

At any point once we get your ballot, you can check the progress online.
*Please allow 2-3 days for the system to update.

If the signature is verified, the ballot will now be marked as "Accepted". You will be credited for participating in this election in the VoteWA system.

The ballot is removed from the security sleeve. This results in secrecy of the vote.

The ballot will be reviewed for potential scanning issues. If there are none, the ballot will be scanned.

All scanned ballots will be moved to a secure location inside the Voting Center.

The election is complete, and preparations for the next election cycle begin.

The County Canvassing Board meets and certifies the election.

At 8 p.m. on Election Night, ballots that have already been scanned are tabulated and results will be reported.

Washington State's New Voting Rights

Felony Conviction and Voting Rights

New Washington Legislation went into effect January 1, 2022 regarding convicted felons and their right to vote.

When is my right to vote restored?

- If you were convicted of a felony in a Washington State court, your right to vote is restored automatically once you are no longer serving a sentence of total confinement in prison.
- If you were convicted of a felony in another state or in federal court, your right to vote is restored automatically as long as you are no longer serving a sentence of total confinement in prison.
- You **do not** lose the right to vote for a misdemeanor conviction or a conviction in juvenile court.



Registering to vote

Once your right to vote is restored, you must register to vote even if you were previously registered. You do not need a certificate of discharge to register to vote.
