On behalf of the Office of the Secretary of State, thank you for participating in our democratic process. I am pleased to present the 2022 General Election Voters’ Pamphlet to help you make informed decisions as you exercise your right to vote. This guide includes information about voting, and the candidates and measures that appear on your ballot.

Before you can participate, you must be registered to vote. Voter registration forms that are mailed or completed online must be received by Oct. 31, and we encourage you to review your registration information today at **VoteWA.gov**. After Oct. 31, you must visit an elections office or voting center during regular business hours or until 8 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 8, to register to vote or update your registration and receive a ballot.

After you have voted your ballot, be sure to sign the return envelope. Your signature is important because election officials check that your signature matches the one on your voter registration record before they count your ballot. Next, return your ballot. If returning by U.S. mail — no postage needed — remember that ballots must be postmarked by Nov. 8 in order to be counted. You can also use an official ballot drop box anywhere in the state. Drop boxes are open until 8 p.m. on Election Day. Check **VoteWA.gov** to locate a ballot drop box or see the status of your ballot.

By voting, you are making your voice heard.

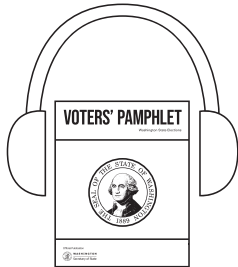

Qualifications

To vote, you must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, a resident of Washington, and not currently serving a sentence of total confinement in prison.



If you're 16 or 17 years old, you can sign up as a Future Voter and be automatically registered to vote when you qualify.

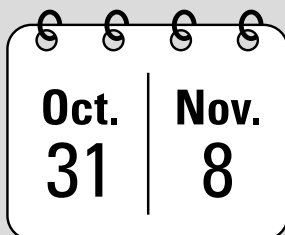

In person: Visit a county elections office (listed at the end of this pamphlet).

Registration deadlines



By mail or online: Your application must be received no later than October 31.

In person: Visit a local voting center no later than 8 p.m. on November 8.

Check your registration info at VoteWA.gov.

Moved? Update your voting address

Contact a county elections office to request a ballot at your new address.



By October 31: Have your application received by mail or updated online.

Or

By November 8: Visit a local voting center in person.

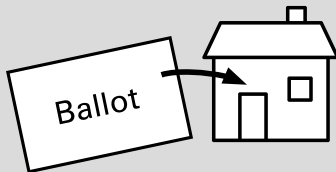
Sign up online at VoteWA.gov with your Washington state driver's license, permit or ID. Or, you can fill out a paper registration form using the last four digits of your Social Security number and mail it in. You'll be automatically registered to vote when you qualify.

Every January on Temperance and Good Citizenship Day, high school students 16 and older have the opportunity to complete a voter registration form in class.

How do I vote and return my ballot?

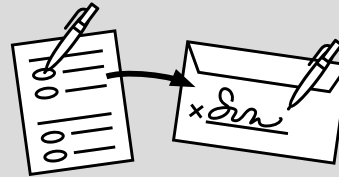

If you're registered to vote, there is no need to request a ballot. Your ballot will be mailed by **October 21** to the address you provide on your voter registration. If you need a replacement ballot, contact a county elections office listed at the end of this pamphlet.



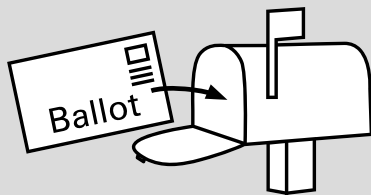

Vote your ballot and sign your return envelope. We need your signature to accept your ballot. You are not required to vote every race on your ballot. We encourage using this pamphlet to help you decide.



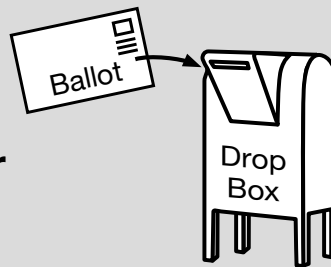

Return your ballot by mail, no stamp needed. If mailed, your ballot must be postmarked by **November 8**. Don't let a late postmark disqualify your ballot. The USPS recommends that you mail a week before Election Day.



Or, return your ballot to an official ballot drop box. Drop boxes are open until 8 p.m. on **November 8**. Find drop box locations at **VoteWA.gov**.

If you cannot personally return your ballot, let only people you trust deliver it for you.

Check the status of your ballot on **VoteWA.gov** to see if it has been received by your county elections office.



Election staff will contact you before your ballot is processed if:

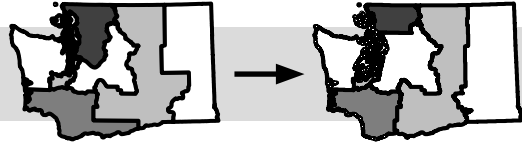
- Your signature is missing
- Your signature doesn't match your voter registration record

View election results online

After 8 p.m. on election night, tallied results from each county are posted at **results.vote.wa.gov**.

Results are updated as counties report and unofficial until certification.

Your district may have changed



Every 10 years, following the U.S. Census, legislative and congressional district boundaries are redrawn in a process called redistricting.

Redistricting ensures that each district has about the same number of people, which means equal representation in government.

As a result of redistricting, you may have been assigned to a new legislative or congressional district.

If you have changed districts, you will vote on different legislative or congressional races, beginning this year.

How do I know if something is true?

When reviewing online or printed information, think about:

- Who made this, and who is it for?
- Why did they make it?
- When was this made?
- What makes it believable?
- How might other people read this message?
- Ask the experts — consult a fact-checking site or ask an official source. Get trusted info from your county auditor or elections office.

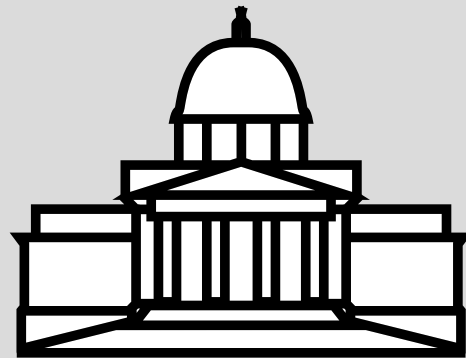


i Advisory votes are the result of Initiative 960, approved by voters in 2007. The Office of the Secretary of State publishes the Attorney General's advisory vote description according to RCW 29A.72.283.

You are advising the Legislature if you do or do not favor a tax increase passed during the recent legislative session.

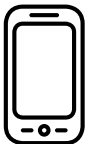
Repeal — means you **don't favor** the tax increase.

Engrossed Substitute House Bill 2076

Engrossed Substitute House Bill 2076 (ESHB 2076)
Narrative Explanation (required for Indeterminate Cash Receipts)
<p>Section 1 requires transportation network companies (TNCs) to remit \$0.15 of every passenger fare quarterly to the newly created Driver Resource Center Fund beginning July 1, 2024. How much is collected will change each January 1 because remittance will be adjusted each year based on inflation. In addition, the Department of Labor & Industries has no way to predict how many passenger fares will be remitted or how many TNCs will be subject to interest and penalties due to failing to remit payments by the deadlines. For these reasons, fiscal impact associated with section 1 is indeterminate.</p> <p>Section 11 of the bill directs L&I to assess premiums for TNC drivers only for hours while the driver is engaged in passenger platform time and dispatch platform time effective January 1, 2023. These premiums would be used for potential future claims and would be deposited in the Accident and Medical Aid Accounts. L&I anticipates that there would be additional claims filed by these workers and L&I would receive additional premiums for this coverage. However, there is not sufficient data on these workers to determine the volume of additional claims or the level of additional premiums. This section of the bill is indeterminate.</p>

If I am a victim of a crime, can I vote safely?

Keep your voting address confidential

You may be able to enroll in the Address Confidentiality Program (ACP) and register as a Protected Records Voter if you are:

- a survivor of domestic violence, sexual assault, trafficking, stalking; or
- a criminal justice participant or election official who is a target for harassment.



To become a Protected Records Voter:

- You meet with a Certified Advocate who can assist with threat assessment, safety planning, and the program application.
- The best time to enroll is when you move or are planning to move to a location that is unknown to the offender and undocumented in public record.

Federal Qualifications & Responsibilities

Except for the President and Vice President, all federal officials elected in Washington must be residents of the state. Only federal offices have age requirements above and beyond being a registered voter.

Congress

The United States' Senate and House of Representatives have equal responsibility for declaring war, maintaining the armed forces, assessing taxes, borrowing money, minting currency, regulating commerce, and making all laws and budgets necessary for the operation of government.

United States Senator

Senators must be at least 30 years old and citizens of the U.S. for at least nine years. Senators serve six-year terms. The Senate has 100 members; two from each state.

The Senate has several exclusive powers, including consenting to treaties, confirming federal appointments made by the President, and trying federal officials impeached by the House of Representatives.

United States Representative

Representatives must be at least 25 years old and citizens of the U.S. for at least seven years. Representatives are not required to be registered voters of their district, but must reside in the state. Representatives serve two-year terms.

The House of Representatives has 435 members, all of whom are up for election in even-numbered years. Each state has a different number of members based on population. After the 2010 Census, Washington was given a 10th Congressional District.

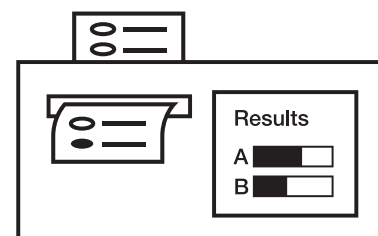
Your ballot is reviewed and scanned

Passage of Proposition No. 1 would allow the levy of taxes over a six-year period to pay for security and technology improvements throughout school facilities, including: (1) acquiring, installing, implementing and modernizing security cameras, access controls, door locks and other security systems; and (2) acquiring, installing, implementing and modernizing student and staff computers, personal computing devices and other technology equipment, hardware and software, and making other improvements and upgrades to the District’s technology equipment, infrastructure, systems and facilities. The Board of Commissioners of Pend Oreille County Fire District 5 adopted Resolution 07.28.2022, concerning an increase to its regular property tax levy. Proposition 1 would provide continued funding for normal operations and maintenance of the district. It authorizes a permanent increase to the district's regular property levy, from \$0.39 to \$0.50 per thousand dollars of assessed value, for collection starting in 2023. The 2023 levy amount will be used for the purpose of computing the limitations for subsequent levies under chapter 84.55 RCW. Qualifying low-income seniors, disabled veterans and other people with disabilities will be exempt from the levy increase under RCW 84.36.381.

Explanatory Statement

Provided by Pend Oreille County Fire District 5

The maximum regular levy rate for Washington Fire Districts is \$1.50 (per thousand dollars of assessed value). Due to the statutory 1% limitation on property tax increases, Pend Oreille County Fire District 5's current levy rate in 2022 is \$0.39.

The Board of Fire Commissioners has determined that an increase to its regular property tax levy is necessary to provide continued funding for normal operations and maintenance of the district. The increased demands and costs of providing fire protection, emergency medical services, proper equipment, and facilities maintenance require the expenditure of revenues in excess of the current limit.

Proposition 1 will increase the district's regular property tax levy to \$0.50 in 2023, which is \$1.00 below the maximum rate allowed by law. The 2023 levy amount will be used to calculate subsequent levy limits. The estimated increase would equal approximately \$1.83 per month for a \$200,000 home. This proposition includes the property tax exemption for qualifying low-income seniors, disabled veterans, and other people with disabilities under RCW 84.36.381.

Argument For

First, we are sorry for asking for more money considering the recent property tax increases. Fire District 5 has worked tirelessly to stretch every dime we could. We have the lowest fire tax rate in the county at 0.39 cent per 1,000 valuation. FD-5 is asking for 11 cent more per 1,000 valuation which would bring our rate to 0.50 cents. Our chief has worked on donations, grants and other ways to get equipment. But there are some goods and services that grants and donations won't cover such as fuel, insurance and certain supplies; all of which have gone up drastically. On a \$200,000 home which currently pays \$78 a year, it would raise your rate to \$100 a year. We really need a \$1.00 per 1,000 valuation, but do not wish to burden the tax payers any more than absolutely necessary. Therefore, the chief and Board of Commissioners settled for 11 cents. Most of the population of Pend Oreille County pay over a \$1.00 per thousand for fire protection. We are simply asking for this increase to offset the rising costs of everyday operations and maintenance.

Pend Oreille County Fire District 5 was formed in 1981 with one firehouse. In 2003 Fire 5 opened Firehouse 52 on its south end at the Fountain Ranch in order to reduce response times. Last year FD-5 started a future Firehouse 53 by staging a unit at Blueslide Resort for the same reason. This is a summer unit currently operating during wildfire season. We are looking for a place to store a truck year-round. We need more revenue in order to operate these firehouses.

Voting for this measure truly benefits the homeowners in Pend Oreille County Fire District 5. Please help us continue operating at our current level of service.

Argument Against

Pend Oreille County Fire District #5 proposes an increase to their levy rate from \$0.39 to \$0.50 per thousand of assessed value. However, this increase is small compared to current costs of providing emergency services to its residents. For instance, inflation has increased the cost of diesel fuel to nearly \$6 per gallon and gasoline isn't far behind. Fire District #5 should ask for larger increase to cover out of control inflation.

A neighboring fire district, Fire District #4, has a levy rate is \$1.33 per thousand. Annual fire service costs \$266 for a \$200,000 home in Fire District #4, while it will only cost only \$100 for the same home in Fire District #5 at the new \$0.50 rate. \$100 is barely enough to cover the costs of even a minor emergency call! The Fire District #5 Board of Commissioners is trying to tread lightly by asking for a small increase; however, the district really needs a larger levy increase to properly fund fire operations and maintenance.

This proposition will authorize the merger of Pend Oreille County Fire Protection District No.8 into South Pend Oreille Fire & Rescue. Both fire districts currently provide fire protection and emergency medical services within their boundaries and have a history of working cooperatively. The Commissioners of both fire districts have determined that a merger of the two organizations into a single fire department is in the best interest of the District's residents.

If a majority of the registered voters of District 8 vote for merger, then the merger will be effective January 1, 2023. If merger is approved, District No. 8 will be dissolved and the boundaries of South Pend Oreille Fire & Rescue will expand to include all areas currently in District 8. The existing commissioners of both Districts will govern the merged district until the number of commissioners is reduced according to law.

Argument For

Fire District 8 was formed in 1993 as a way to protect both life and property. In addition, over time, the Fire District was able to meet additional insurance fire ratings which have resulted in reduced insurance premiums. However, demand for extended services, such as medical, have taken its toll on the fire district, resulting in increased need for help from other districts. This help is met only when the other districts have available time and resources. FD 8's proposal is to merge with South Pend Oreille Fire and Rescue (SPOFR). The following highlights the benefit to FD 8 of doing so:

- Inter-agency training performed by professional certified trainers.
- Larger pool of qualified personnel.
- Combining of personnel to combat attendance and attrition.
- Eliminating redundancy in administration, maintenance and training.
- Enhanced medical response.
- Enhanced capital expenditure for facilities and equipment.
- Will help us maintain our current insurance fire rating.

As FD 8 continues to see additional growth in our community, the status-quo will not keep up with demand. Should nothing change, services will be difficult to meet.

Argument Against

The tax basis for District 8 residents will increase as a result of the consolidation with South Pend Oreille Fire and Rescue to match the surrounding taxing districts in SPOFR. Line item "Fire Protection Property Tax" will increase by an estimated \$99 per year for a \$300,000 property valuation. The residents of District 8 will now contribute to the response of SPOFR assets that are currently frequently provided through mutual aid agreements that SPOFR provides without compensation.

*Aquatic weed management, both milfoil and water shield as well as monitoring for other invasive weeds.

*Upkeep and maintenance of the Myers/Harter sanctuary, where the annual SLA picnic is held. *Lake level management. Access to the beaver tubes for the volunteers who help keep our beaver tubes cleared. *Insurance that covers our volunteers, park, and district board.

The funds collected through our voted levy have long been used to keep our lake water from being taken over by unwanted and invasive weeds. The County will not do it for us. Levy funds are collected from all district property owners through property taxes and are returned directly to our lake community.

Argument For

The funds collected through the levy are used to treat the invasive weeds in Sacheen Lake, to maintain the Myers-Harter Sanctuary Park, which is open to the public as well as Sacheen Lake residents, and to mitigate the beaver dams in the Little Spokane River in order to regulate the lake level. Without the levy the milfoil would be out of control and our lake level would be more difficult to predict. This levy is essential to keeping Sacheen Lake free of invasive weeds and beautiful for everyone to enjoy.

New Washington resident

Welcome! Register to vote online, by mail, in person, or when you get your new driver's license or ID at the Department of Licensing. You may not vote in more than one place, so cancel your previous voter registration.



Military or overseas voter

Register to vote anytime on or before Election Day. You may receive your ballot by mail, email, or fax. Spouses and dependents also away from home have the same voting rights.



College student

Register to vote using either your home or school address, but you may not vote in more than one place. Your ballot can be mailed to you anywhere in the world; however, your residential address must remain in Washington.



Non-traditional address voter

Use any physical location you consider your residence such as a shelter, park, or marina. Your mailing address can be general delivery at a local post office, a PO Box, or an address of a trusted friend or relative. A federally recognized tribe may designate tribal government buildings to serve as residential or mailing addresses for voters living on tribal lands.



Seasonal resident

Vote in Washington even if you're away during an election. To ensure you receive your ballot, update your mailing address at VoteWA.gov or with a county elections office. Your ballot can be mailed to you anywhere in the world; however, your residential address must remain in Washington. You may not vote in more than one place.



Person convicted of a felony

If you were convicted of a felony in Washington, your right to vote is restored when you are no longer serving a sentence of total confinement in prison. After your right to vote is restored, you must re-register to vote in order to receive a ballot.

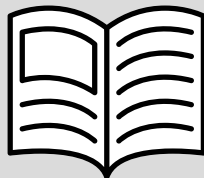

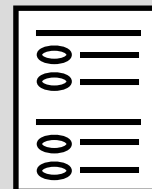

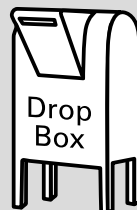

VoteWA is a collaboration between the Office of the Secretary of State and all 39 Washington counties to create an advanced, centralized system for both voter registration and election management.

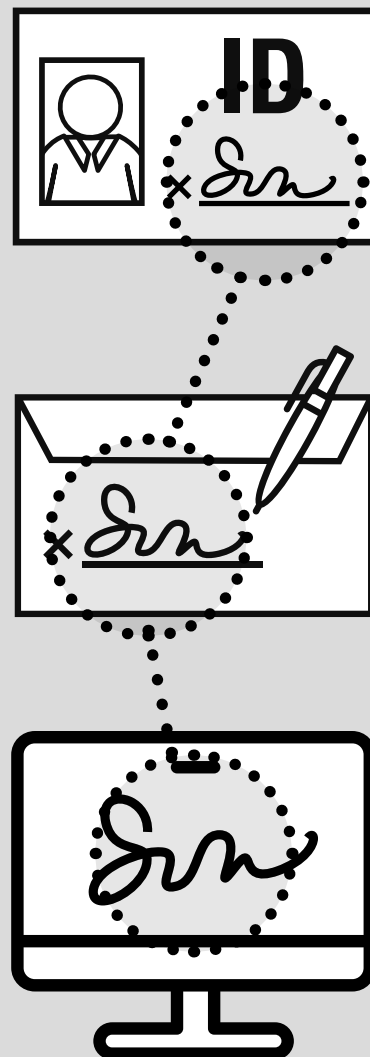
Your signature is needed to make sure your ballot gets counted.

The signature on your return envelope is compared to the signature on your voter registration record. Election officials verify each and every signature.

If your signature is missing or does not match your voter registration record, the county elections office will contact you by mail **before certification**. They may call or email if you gave them this info.

If you registered to vote online or through Department of Licensing, the signature from your driver's license or state ID will be on your voter registration record.

Voters can track and check their ballot status at **VoteWA.gov**.



Oct. 31, 2022 – Deadline for online or mailed voter registrations or updates to be received.



Nov. 1, 2022 – USPS recommends mailing voted ballot back at least one week before Election Day.

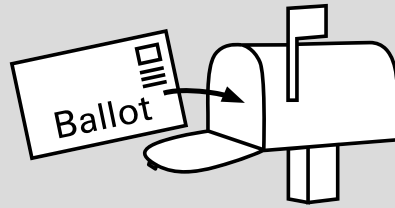

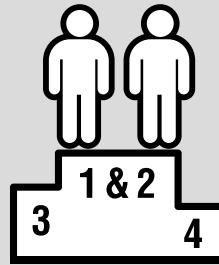

No party affiliation

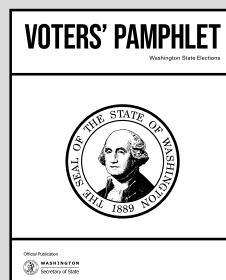


Washington voters do not register by party affiliation. Vote for any candidate regardless of their party preference.

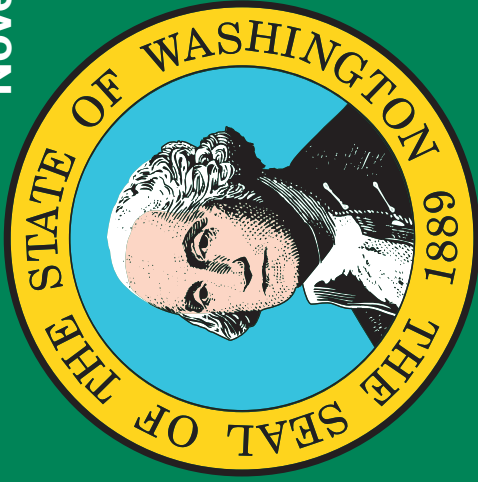
