Your request of May 3, 1899, by telegram to Asst. Secy. of War, for return af to the United States of the remains of Capt. George H. Fortson, late 1st Wash. Volunteers, who died at Manila, P.I., in battle, has been placed on file, and will receive attention when the remains of soldiers and others buried in the Philippine Islands are prepared for shipment to the United States.

In view of a report from the Commanding General, Philippine Islands, dated April 1, 1889, that it is impracticable to ship bodies now, on account of danger to health of inhabitants and uncertainty of preservation of remains during voyage (the process of embalming immediately after death being unsuccessful), the Acting Secretary of War directs that no further effort be made to bring home the dead before next fall. Not only the graves, but the boxes containing the dead, will be marked with care.

If the remains can be identified you will be duly advised, by telegraph, of the approximate date of their transportation to the address given.

The cost of disinterment and shipment to point indicated by relative, or legal representative, will be borne by the Covernment.

Sir :-

Replying to your communication of the 28th ultimo, to the Adjutant General, U.S. Army, requesting to be informed whether the Government will undertake to bring the bodies of soldiers who died at Manila to the United States, I have the honor to inform you that the bodies will all be brought home, but those recently interred may have to be left until next winter.

The nearest relatives of the deceased, who desire return of their remains to their former homes, should make immediate application to this office, giving in each case the full name, rank, company, regiment, and date and place of death of the soldier; also, the name and address of the person to whom it is desired the body be consigned.

Remains not called for by relatives will be interred in a National Cemetery.
